- L2¹: SVOI: cf. Hulk (1991) (p. 17), who cite Schwartz and Tomasello as claiming “SVOI is not a possible word order of natural languages”, although Hulk found that 13% of her first grade Dutch learners of French guessed the following to be acceptable French, though it’s NOT; I think it has rather a nice ring:

(1) Je crois que Jean mang e les fraises a
I believe that Jean eaten the strawberries has

Van Kemenade (cf. citation OE²) also argues on the basis that the above word order does not appear in OE.

- OE_p¹: SOIV: Pintzuk (1999), p. 29, ex. 12:

(2)  æt he  æt godes hus wolde mid fyre forb ernan
that he the god’s house would with fire burn
“... that he would burn the house of God with fire ...” ( ELS 25.613-614)

- OE²: SVIO: Pintzuk (1999), p. 25, ex. 7:

(3)  æt  enig mon atellan m ege ealne  one demm
that any man relate can all the misery
“... that any man can relate all the misery ...” (Or 52.6-7)

- OE³: ISOV: Pintzuk (1999), p. 21, ex. 3:
 - (4) hæfde se cyning his fierd on tu tonumen
had the king his army in two divided
“The king had divided his army in two...” (ChronA 84.31 (894))
- OE⁴: SIOV: Pintzuk (1999), p. 23, ex. 5:
 - (5) þæt nan mann ne mihte ða meniu geriman
that no man not could the multitude count
“... that no man could count the multitude ...” (ÆLS 25.418)
- OE⁵_p: OSIV: Pintzuk (1999), p. 29, ex. 13:
 - (6) þæt hiene mon wolde mid þæm ilcan wrence beþridian
that him one would with the same strategy overpower
“... that one would overpower him with the same strategy ...” (Or. 155.1-2)
